TOURNAMENT HISTORY

A GLORIOUS PAST, AN EXCITING FUTURE



Just over quarter of a century after winning the first AFF Championship in Singapore in 1996, Thailand returned to the Lion City to lift their sixth title at the 2020 edition. The years in between saw one of the world's most passionate and colourful international tournaments become a highlight of the Southeast Asian sporting calendar.

The first-ever AFF Championship match in 1996 featured one of ASEAN's greatest players scoring an 89th-minute equaliser as Fandi Ahmad cancelled out K. Sanbagamaran's opening goal to ensure hosts Singapore earned a 1-1 draw with Malaysia in Kallang.

Singapore ultimately exited in the group stage as Thailand and Malaysia advanced before winning their respective semi-finals. And it was Kiatisuk 'Zico'

Senamuang who was the hero in the final as his early strike proved enough for the War Elephants to be crowned inaugural champions of a competition that had caught the imagination of the region.

Vietnam played host in 1998 and it was they who ousted the defending champions in the semi-finals following a 3-0 victory in Hanoi, while Singapore edged Indonesia in Ho Chi Minh City to book their ticket to the final.



Just like two years earlier, one goal was enough, with R. Sasikumar writing his name into Singaporean football history by scoring with 20 minutes to play to break Vietnamese hearts and seal his country's first major piece of silverware.

A new millennium, a new host as the tournament moved to Thailand in 2000, and the Thais breezed through the group stage with Kiatisuk scoring in each game before he was again on the mark in the semi-final victory over Malaysia.

But it was Worrawoot Srimaka who stole the headlines in the final against Indonesia, scoring a hat-trick in a 4-1 win to seal the title.

Two titles in three editions became three in four for the War Elephants but the 2002 competition, co-hosted by Indonesia and Singapore, would be the last time they lifted the title for 12 years.

After squeezing through the group stage on goal difference, Thailand eased past

Vietnam in the semi-finals to book a date with an Indonesian side looking for revenge after defeating Malaysia in the other semi-final.

In front of 100,000 at Jakarta's Gelora Bung Karno Stadium, second-half goals from Garuda duo Yaris Riyadi and Gendut Doni Christiawan cancelled out first-half strikes from Chukiat Noosarung and Therdsak Chaiman. But Indonesia's dream ended in the cruellest fashion as it was Thailand – despite Kiatisuk missing the opening spot-kick – who prevailed on penalties.

Thailand's reign was ended in 2004, however, when they were eliminated at the group stage in a campaign that saw Myanmar reach the last four for the first time before narrowly losing out to Singapore in the first two-legged semifinals.

Having overcome Malaysia in the other semi-final, Indonesia returned to the final



for the third time in a row. It was not third time lucky, however, with a 3-1 loss in Jakarta followed by a 2-1 defeat in Kallang seeing Singapore crowned champions for the second time.

Noh Alam Shah's seven-goal haul in Singapore's 11-0 group stage win over Laos remains part of the tournament's folklore, although in reality the striker would score more important goals in 2007. An equaliser against Malaysia in the first leg of the semi-final proved crucial as the Singaporeans ultimately advanced on penalties before he also netted as the Lions saw off Thailand 2-1 in the first leg of the final in Kallang.

One down in the return meeting in Bangkok, Khairul Amri powered home the goal that saw Singapore draw level with Thailand on three titles after a 3-2 victory. Alam Shah's record-breaking 10 goals, meanwhile, won him the Golden Boot and MVP awards.

A 20-year-old Teerasil Dangda netted his first AFF Championship goals in 2008, scoring twice against Malaysia in the group stage and then again in the semifinal victory against Indonesia.

In the other semi-final, Vietnam ended Singapore's hopes of becoming the first team to win three in a row as they returned to the final a decade after their first appearance.

Aiming for a fourth title, Thailand were stunned by Vietnam when goals from Nguyen Vu Phong and Le Cong Vinh saw the Golden Star Warriors win 2-1 at Rajamangala Stadium.

Back in Hanoi, Teerasil opened the scoring but Cong Vinh's 94th-minute equaliser sparked pandemonium around My Dinh Stadium as Vietnam sealed a 3-2 aggregate win to become the third different nation to be crowned champions.

Two years later, Vietnam were the only former winner to reach the semi-finals, but a pair of first-leg Safee Sali goals saw Malaysia oust the holders to return to the final for the first time since 1996.

Up against Indonesia, Safee was the star as he netted twice in a 3-0 first-leg win at Bukit Jalil National Stadium and added another in the return meeting at Gelora Bung Karno Stadium as the Harimau Malaya ran out 4-2 aggregate winners to lift their first title.

Thailand and Singapore returned to the fore in 2012 as the tournament's two most successful sides saw off the defending champions and the Philippines respectively in the semi-finals to progress to the main event.

Amri again proved a thorn in Thailand's side, scoring Singapore's second in between a penalty from Fahrudin Mustafic and a late Baihakki Khaizan goal in a 3-1 win at Jalan Besar Stadium which, after a 1-0 loss in Bangkok, was enough for the Lions to win an unprecedented fourth title.

It was a record that lasted just two years as, boosted by the emergence of Chanathip Songkrasin, Thailand defeated Singapore in their opening game in 2014 before easing past the Philippines in the semi-finals.

Up against Malaysia in the final, they won 2-0 in Bangkok, only to fall three down in Kuala Lumpur. But Chanathip stepped up in the final 10 minutes when, first, his freekick was only parried out allowing Charyl Chappuis to level and, then, he scored a stunning left-footed effort to seal a 4-3 aggregate win.

After winning three titles between 1996 and 2002, meanwhile, Kiatisuk became the first person to lift the trophy as a player and manager. Two years later, he guided Thailand to a third successive final, where they were up against familiar foes Indonesia.

Teerasil opened the scoring with a crucial away goal in the first leg in Bogor and, although the Garuda eventually won 2-1 on the night, Siroch Chatthong's brace in Bangkok saw the War Elephants crowned champions for a fifth time.

Having been named MVP in both 2014 and 2016, Chanathip was absent in 2018 as a much-hyped Vietnam side boasting one of ASEAN's finest talents in Nguyen Quang Hai took centre stage. The Golden Star Warriors advanced from the group stage without conceding and then claimed back-to-back wins over the Philippines in the last four.

Goals from Nguyen Huy Hung and Pham Duc Huy put Park Hang-seo's side two up against Malaysia in the final but, spurred on by a capacity crowd at Bukit Jalil National Stadium, Shahrul Saad and Safawi Rasid ensured the first leg ended 2-2 as the sides headed to Hanoi with the tie on a knife edge.



Veteran striker Nguyen Anh Duc then calmed any nerves at My Dinh Stadium, volleying home Quang Hai's dinked cross in the sixth minute with a goal that ultimately secured the title.

Then, after being postponed for a year due to Covid-19, the 2020 edition was held at the end of 2021 in Singapore as, for the first time since 2000, the tournament was staged in a single country.



Some 25 years after his father had scored in the first-ever AFF Championship game, Ikhsan Fandi got Singapore off to a winning start with two goals against Myanmar and was again on the scoresheet in the semi-final against Indonesia.

However, Indonesia prevailed to line up yet another clash with Thailand, who had seen a returning Chanathip score both goals in their 2-0 semi-final win over Vietnam.

And it was more disappointment for the Garuda, with Chanathip scoring twice in an emphatic 4–0 first-leg win for Thailand. The ensuing 2–2 draw confirmed title number six while Chanathip picked up the MVP for a record-extending third time.

Now, after the Covid-19-enforced centralised campaign, the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 returns to the homeand-away format as a tournament famed for high-octane action on the pitch and vibrancy in the stands promises to deliver yet another thrilling edition.














DEFENDING CHAMPIONS REVIEW

CHANATHIP **RETURNS TO FIRE** THAILAND TO GLORY



Having seen their hopes of a third successive title quashed in 2018, Thailand were back with renewed hunger at the 2020 edition as they returned to the summit of Southeast Asian football by lifting the trophy for a record-extending sixth time.

Champions on three occasions between 1996 and 2002 when the likes of Kiatisuk 'Zico' Senamuang and Worrawoot Srimaka helped them dominate the early years of the tournament, Thailand had to wait a further 12 years to win title number four.

Inspired by a young Chanathip Songkrasin, the War Elephants produced a memorable win over Malaysia in the 2014 final and retained the title two years later after Siroch Chatthong's brace secured victory over Indonesia to seal their record fifth title. However, without Chanathip, Theerathon Bunmathan and Teerasil Dangda, Thailand were beaten by Malaysia in the 2018 semi-finals.

After the tournament was delayed for a year due to Covid-19, Thailand returned at the 2020 edition in Singapore aiming to reclaim the trophy. Under Brazilian Alexandré Pölking, the trio of Chanathip, Theerathon and Teerasil were all included in a squad that was many people's tip for the title.

But it was one of their newer generation of stars that shone in the opening game against Timor-Leste as Supachok Sarachat volleyed home the second goal in a 2-0 victory.

Teerasil stole the headlines in Thailand's 4-0 win over Myanmar, firing home a lovely opener from outside the box before doubling his side's advantage from the spot with a strike that drew him level on 17 goals with Singapore's Noh Alam Shah at the top of the tournament's all-time scoring charts.

And the record soon belonged to Teerasil alone after his lovely finish from Theerathon's cross saw his side go one up against the Philippines with what was his 18th AFF Championship goal. The striker scored number 19 with another penalty to secure a 2-1 win and a place in the semifinals.

"I don't know how often I can come here and praise him; he's the best striker I've coached and the best striker I've seen and he just proved that again," admitted Pölking.

"He creates chances, he came up with another world-class finish tonight and I hope he can keep going so that we can reach and win the final."

With top spot still to play for, Elias Dolah and Supachai Jaided scored to seal a 2-0 victory over hosts Singapore and make it a perfect four wins from four.

Back in the semi-finals, Thailand faced defending champions Vietnam and it was Chanathip who stole the show, racing through to put his side in front inside 15



minutes before capping a fine flowing move by tapping into the bottom right corner to make it two midway through the first half.

Nguyen Quang Hai struck the woodwork with a free-kick before Chanathip spurned the opportunity to complete his hat-trick by missing a late penalty but the 2-0 victory ensured they went into the second leg in a commanding position.

The subsequent 0-0 draw secured a return to the final, which was a repeat of the 2016 edition, with Indonesia the opponents and looking to end their long wait to be crowned champions.

But it was Thailand who got off to a blistering start when Philip Roller teed up Chanathip to fire home a left-footed effort inside two minutes.

Supachok created the second for Chanathip seven minutes after the interval before getting on the scoresheet himself in the 67th minute to make it three. Bordin Phala rounded off the scoring in the final 10 minutes as Thailand went into the return meeting with one hand on the trophy.

Indonesia gave themselves some hope when Ricky Kambuaya opened the scoring early in the second leg but goals from Adisak Kraisorn and Sarach Yooven in the 54th and 56th minutes put the result beyond doubt and ensured Egy Maulana's equaliser 10 minutes from time was only a consolation.

The 6-2 aggregate victory meant Thailand returned to the podium as winners for a sixth time, while Chanathip was named MVP for a third time, adding to the accolades he won in 2014 and 2016 as he once again proved to be the leading light in Southeast Asian football.

Teerasil's four goals, meanwhile, meant he finished as the joint-top scorer, alongside Malaysia's Safawi Rasid, Bienvenido Marañón of the Philippines and Chanathip. The striker has now found the back of the net in the 2008, 2012, 2016 and 2020. editions.

"After such a difficult year, football is still a great opportunity to make people happy and I hope this is a New Year gift for all people in Thailand," reflected Pölking.

"I'm so happy that we won but also that we won in a special way and I just have to give thanks to everyone from the staff, the officials and especially to the players.

"This is a prestigious competition and we showed some brilliant moments of football. defended well when we had to and created the most chances in the tournament, so we have to take that belief to the next level now."

Since lifting the title, Thailand have gone on to secure their passage to a second successive AFC Asian Cup after qualifying for the 2023 continental competition.

With Pölking still at the helm, Thailand return to the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup looking to successfully defend their crown for the third time having won backto-back titles in 2000 and 2002 then in 2014 and 2016 as they aim to extend their record to seven titles.

The War Elephants have been placed in Group A alongside Indonesia, the Philippines, Cambodia and Brunei Darussalam.

Pölking's team will open their campaign against Brunei, then welcome the Philippines to Thammasat Stadium. A trip to Indonesia will follow before they round off the group stage at home to Cambodia.

Q&A WITH THAILAND HEAD COACH

ALEXANDRÉ PÖLKING

Having been in Southeast Asia for many years, can you describe what makes the football culture in this part of the world - and the support for the national teams - so special?


People here in Southeast Asia are really passionate about football and they all love the sport. It is also a good place to live with the family. Many people in the region are following a lot of English football as well, and with the Premier League being so strong at the moment, I believe more and more people are enjoying watching football.

2 After taking over the most successful side in the AFF Championship's history last year, how would you describe the pressure of managing Thailand? Is anything other than lifting the trophy a failure?

I believe that managing top national teams in the AFF Championship always comes with a lot of pressure because the expectations are really high. Here in Thailand, people always expect us to win, especially because of our good record in this championship. If you do not win, it will be always seen as a failure.

Thailand were unbeaten on their march to the 2020 title. From a personal perspective, what was the most pleasing part of the campaign?

There were great players with great attitude in the team and we could create fantastic team spirit from the first day. We grew together as a team game by game and showed good performances.



4 Unlike last year when the tournament was played in Singapore, the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup returns to a home and away basis. How much does this enhance the competition, and what challenges does this format bring?

For me, that is great for the simple fact that we can have our fans behind us and that will always help. Sure!!! We will of course have to handle the pressure of playing away as well, but personally, I like this home and away format.

5 Thailand will face a rematch of the 2020 final when you travel to Jakarta to play Indonesia in the group stage. What are your thoughts on that game and what kind of atmosphere do you expect at the stadium?

Clearly, it is going to be the most difficult game because we are expecting a full house at their stadium and Indonesia is a very good team. So, we need to be very focused and play our best football in order to stand a chance of winning that game.

6 The War Elephants will be targeting a record-extending seventh title. Which teams do you think will offer the biggest threat to Thailand retaining the trophy and why?

Vietnam, Malaysia, and Indonesia are all very strong teams with good coaches and will probably have good amount of time to prepare for this competition as usual. I feel they all are the prime candidates to challenge for the title.

7 Four of the teams - Thailand, Indonesia, Malaysia, and Vietnam - have qualified for next year's AFC Asian Cup. With club sides in Southeast Asia also doing well at continental level, why do you think football in the region is improving?

It is very important that we, the four Southeast Asian teams, qualified and I really hope that one of us can go really far in the competition. We still have a lot of room for improvement. I believe our national leagues must be more professional and the clubs must invest more in the youths and infrastructure. That is the key for me.

8 A number of Thai players have had the chance to move abroad in recent seasons. After the success of Chanathip Songkrasin and Theerathon Bunmathan in Japan, how advantageous is it for the players' development to play overseas?

It is a huge advantage, especially for the players. To get out of the comfort zone and fight in the leagues that are stronger than ours, this helps them to learn a lot and improve their football quality.

Players such as Supachok Sarachat, Supachai Jaided and Suphanat Mueanta are part of the next generation of talent after Chanathip and Theerathon. How happy are you with the quality that has been developed at youth level in recent years?

We have many good young players performing very well now in the Thai League 1 and we need to continue to develop them and the others. As an example, Buriram United just sent three of their players to train with Leicester City FC for a few weeks and I believe such moves are very beneficial for these young players.

10 Finally, the team will be back playing in front of the Thailand fans in Bangkok at the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup. How does that make you feel and what are your goals for the tournament?

We will fight to win again and I am pretty sure that our fans will support us. Given the opportunity, our fans will fill up our stadium and create a loud and incredible atmosphere during the matches. We have an amazing fanbaseand as we continue to recover from the pandemic, I am sure they will be delighted to attend the games at the stadium again and get behind us as we defend the title as the reigning champions.

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
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

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OFFICIAL DRAW



The Official Draw for the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 took place in Bangkok on 30 August 2022, revealing the pathway to glory for the 10 participating teams.

The event was held at Shangri-La Bangkok in Thailand, with the proceedings conducted by AFF President Major General Khiev Sameth, in the presence of representatives from the different member federations, participating teams, sponsors and broadcast partners.

Defending champions Thailand were drawn in Group A alongside the 2020 edition's runners-up Indonesia. Philippines, Cambodia and the winner of the qualification round Brunei Darussalam join them in Group A.

Meanwhile, 2018 champions Vietnam were placed in Group B, where they will face 2010 winners Malaysia, four-time champions Singapore, Myanmar and Laos.

During the Official Draw event, the AFF also announced the dates of the tournament, as well as the welcome return to a full home-and-away format, in which each team will play two games at home and two games away in the Group Stage.

AFF President, Major General Khiev Sameth, said, "We are glad to have finalised the dates of the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 and the official aroupings for all the teams. ASEAN fans will have much to look forward to following the draw, with all the exciting matchups in the respective group matches. We are in for a thrilling and competitive tournament. I am confident that the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 will surpass all expectations, both on and off the field, and emerge as the best edition yet."

President of the Football Association of Thailand, Police General Somyot Poompanmoung, said, "We are delighted to have hosted the Official Draw in Bangkok and kickstart the countdown to a new era of ASEAN football. The 2020 edition has been a very successful one for the Thai National Team and we are looking forward to defending the title later this year."

Alexandré Pölking, Thailand National Football Coach, said, "I believe the home and away format for this year's tournament will be very nice for the fans especially. With two Group Stage games being played at home, it will give a different atmosphere and makes it more special from the previous edition."

Leading up to the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022, the ultimate prize of Southeast Asia's flagship football competition embarked on a tour of five cities in the region. Beginning on 24 September in Bangkok, Thailand, the home of the current champions, the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 Trophy Tour made stops in Singapore (15 October), Selangor, Malaysia (22 October), Jakarta, Indonesia (26 November), before concluding in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam (3 December).

With the aim of building excitement, as well as rallying the fans and community to get behind their teams at their home stadiums, each stop of the Trophy Tour featured special appearances by local football legends such as Therdsak Chaiman and Pipob On-Mo in Bangkok,

Lionel Lewis and Baihakki Khaizan in Singapore, Norshahrul Idlan, Mahali Jasuli and Shahrom Kalam in Selangor, and many more. BRUNEI DARUSSALAM

It's been a new coach, new ideas and a new dawn for football in Brunei Darussalam as they made it to the AFF Championship for the first time after 26 years.

Brunei's only previous appearance in ASEAN's biennial showpiece was in 1996 when the AFF Championship was in its inaugural edition.

The Hornets were paired alongside Thailand, Malaysia, the Philippines and hosts Singapore in 1996 as a new era in ASEAN football began.

After losing their opening two matches, Brunei posted a 1-0 victory over the Philippines when Irwan Mohammad netted the winner at the National Stadium in Kallang.

However, that remained Brunei's only win and only appearance in an AFF Championship as they failed to make it through the qualifying rounds for ensuing editions.

They came close to qualifying in 2012 when they fell one point short of Laos in the five-team qualification tournament despite posting wins against Cambodia and Timor-Leste in Yangon.

In 2018, having lost the first leg 3-1 against Timor-Leste, they came within a goal of booking their ticket to the group stage after winning the return meeting 1-0, but the Timorese ultimately edged through 3-2 on aggregate.

However, revenge was sweet for Brunei this time round as Mario Rivera's team got the better of Timor-Leste to take the final spot in the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022.

Braces from Abdul Azizi Ali Rahman and Muhammad Razimie Ramlli gave Brunei a commanding 6-2 first-leg victory in Bandar Seri Begawan before the 1-0 defeat in the return meeting secured their progress.

The victory built on the early positive signs under Rivera, who steered Brunei to a 1-0 win in a friendly against Laos shortly after taking charge in September. The former East Bengal coach in the Indian Super League will now look to continue that upward trajectory on their long-awaited return to the group stage.

Brunei's AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup campaign sees them drawn alongside Thailand, Indonesia, the Philippines and Cambodia in Group A.

CAMBODIA

With a brand new, state-of-the-art stadium in Phnom Penh and Japanese icon Keisuke Honda overseeing the general manager role for more than four years, there is little doubt Cambodia are a side with lofty ambitions.

The AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 will be their ninth appearance in the tournament and, while they have been eliminated at the group stage each time, the signs have been positive recently.

Cambodia were part of the inaugural edition in 1996, then picked up their first victory in 2000 when Hok Sochetra bagged a brace in a 3-0 win over Laos. Two years later, a lastminute Ung Kanyanith goal secured a 1-0 victory against the Philippines.

But it would be 16 years until they enjoyed another victory in the competition as the 2004, 2008 and 2016 editions saw the Koupreys lose all 10 of their games.

Then, on the back of Honda's appointment in 2018, Cambodia hosted its first-ever AFF Championship match as a wave of optimism swept across the nation.

Almost 35,000 turned out at Phnom Penh's National Olympic Stadium to witness a hard-fought 1-0 loss against a Malaysia side that would go on to reach the final. Then, after defeat in Myanmar, goals from Chan Vathanaka, Prak Mony Udom and Keo Sokpheng helped Cambodia defeat Laos 3-1 for only their third victory in the competition.

There were more positive signs at the 2020 edition, as Cambodia recorded another victory over Laos. Vathanaka netted twice but perhaps the highlight was a lovely goal by teenage forward Sieng Chanthea who showed plenty of promise for the future.

Since then, Cambodia were beaten by India and Hong Kong, and picked up a draw against Afghanistan, in their 2023 AFC Asian Cup qualifying campaign. Hopes remain high, however, ahead of the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup as they prepare to play their first competitive matches in their new home stadium

They begin against the Philippines in Phnom Penh before matches against Indonesia, Brunei Darussalam and Thailand.

INDONESIA

Indonesia have appeared in the final of the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup in six of the 13 tournaments.

Having reached the semi-finals in 1996 and 1998, Indonesia made it to their first final in 2000, losing 4-1 to Thailand.

Bambang Pamungkas scored a tournament-leading eight goals enroute to the final two years later. Then, with the Garuda two down to Thailand, goals from Yaris Riyadi and Gendut Doni Christiawan reignited hope of a first title, only for the Thais to prevail from the spot.

After a stunning 4-1 second-leg win over Malaysia in the semifinal, a third successive final defeat followed in 2004 after they were convincingly beaten by Singapore over two legs.

Under Alfred Riedl in 2010, the Merah Putih returned to the final but a 3-0 first-leg loss to Malaysia all but ended their dream as they eventually lost 4-2 on aggregate.

Group stage exits followed in 2012 and 2014 before 2016 saw Indonesia rise again when they overcame Vietnam in the semi-finals to secure another date with Thailand. However, after winning the first leg 2–1, it was a familiar ending as they lost 2–0 in Bangkok.

Indonesia fell in their group in 2018, but under Shin Taeyong, a youthful side excelled last time out, topping a group that included holders Vietnam and Malaysia before ousting Singapore in the semi-finals. While they were beaten in the final by Thailand, Shin has since guided them to the 2023 AFC Asian Cup.

Several key players are now plying their trade abroad, with Egy Maulana in Slovakia, Elkan Baggott in England, and Asnawi Mangkualam and Pratama Arhan in Korea Republic and Japan respectively.

In a further sign of their upward trajectory, Indonesia qualified for the 2023 AFC Asian Cup, where they will make their first appearance since 2007. Before that, however, their aim is to end years of hurt by finally triumphing at the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup.

LAOS

Laos have appeared in 12 of the 13 AFF Championships, missing out only in 2016 since their debut in 1996.

In the inaugural 1996 tournament, they beat Cambodia 1-0 and came within moments of claiming a huge upset against Vietnam when they led courtesy of Chalana Luang-Amath's goal, only for Vietnam to equalise with five minutes to play.

The Laotians also drew with Malaysia in 1998 and 2002 before Luang-Amath scored twice in a 2-1 win over Cambodia in 2004 for their last win in the AFF Championship.

Since then, they have produced impressive draws against two ASEAN powerhouses, although both results were tinged with regret given how close they came to delivering the biggest wins in their history.

In 2010, Laos twice led Thailand, only to concede a lastminute equaliser before the same scenario played out two vears later when Indonesia levelled with less than a minute to play. In 2012, they went two up against eventual champions Singapore but lost 4-3.

Since then, Laos lost all their games at the 2014, 2018 and 2020 editions, meaning it's 13 losses in a row since the draw against Indonesia.

However, they now have a new head coach, Hans Michael Weiss, who guided the Philippines to the semi-finals in 2012. In four friendlies under him this year, Laos picked up two wins against Mongolia and Brunei Darussalam.

Weiss guided the Laos U-19 team to the final of the 2022 AFF U-19 Youth Championship in July and will hope to have a similar impact on the senior side.

Laos will not have an easy start to the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 as they host 2018 champions Vietnam before facing Malaysia in Kuala Lumpur. They will then welcome Singapore to Vientiane before a trip to Myanmar.

MALAYSIA

Champions in 2010 and finalists on three other occasions, Malaysia are one of just four nations to win the AFF Championship. However, following a group stage exit last time out, they return looking for improvements at the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022.

A little under a year ago, Tan Cheng Hoe's side went into the 2020 AFF Championship with expectations riding high following an impressive run in 2018 that saw them reach the final only to go down to Vietnam 3-2 on aggregate.

But what ensued was an early exit as the Harimau Malaya failed to live up to expectations. Despite beginning with wins over Cambodia and Laos, Tan's side fell to defeats to Vietnam and Indonesia leading to their elimination and the head coach's resignation.

In came Korean Kim Pan-gon who has got off to a fine start helping Malaysia qualify for the 2023 AFC Asian Cup as they return to the competition for the first time since co-hosting it in 2007.

The team recorded wins over Bangladesh and Turkmenistan and ran Bahrain close in a 2-1 loss in the AFC Asian Cup qualifiers while draws against hosts Thailand and Tajikistan at the 2022 King's Cup suggest Malaysia are a force on the ascendancy under the former Ulsan Hyundai winger.

The onus will now be on Kim and his squad to show that 2020 was a blip as they aim to challenge for the title again.

Malaysia have reached the final of the AFF Championship four times and lifted the trophy once in 2010, when Safee Sali's three goals over the two-legged final handed Malaysia a 4-2 aggregate win over Indonesia as more than 98,000 spectators attended the first leg at Bukit Jalil National Stadium.

Malaysia were also the finalists in the inaugural tournament in 1996, losing 1-0 to Thailand in a single-legged title decider, and in 2014 when it was once again the War Elephants who broke Malaysian hearts with a 4-3 victory over two legs.

Following their 2022 AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup opener against Myanmar, the Harimau Malaya will lock horns with Laos in Kuala Lumpur before playing Vietnam away and then returning home to host their Causeway neighbours Singapore.

MYANMAR

Myanmar have played in every AFF Championship since its launch in 1996 when they opened with a resounding 5-0 win over Cambodia, with their tournament highlights being runs to the semi-finals in 2004 and 2016.

Coached by Ivan Kolev, Myanmar's first foray into the semifinals in 2004 was after they topped a group that featured defending champions Thailand, Malaysia, the Philippines and Timor-Leste. A draw against the holders and victory over the Malaysians remain two of their standout results in the competition's history.

The White Angels then gave Singapore an almighty scare in the semi-finals going 2-1 up before losing the first leg 4-3 and then taking the second leg into extra-time. It was not to be, however, as the Singaporeans broke Myanmar hearts.

In 2016, Myanmar qualified from a group that featured Vietnam and Malaysia. Coached by Gerd Zeise and inspired by the goalscoring heroics of Aung Thu, Myanmar returned to the semi-finals after David Htan's 89th-minute winner against the Malaysians in Yangon.

Defeat to Thailand followed but two years later under another German, Antoine Hey, Myanmar posted wins over Cambodia and Laos, as well as holding eventual champions Vietnam, only just missing out on a place in the final four.

Hey was back for the 2020 edition, although performances under the former Schalke 04 midfielder failed to match 2018 as three defeats and just one win, against Timor-Leste, saw them exit at the first hurdle.

Since then, Myanmar took part in the 2023 AFC Asian Cup qualifiers, but failed to progress after defeats to Kyrgyz Republic, Tajikistan and Singapore.

However, Hey will hope it's third time lucky at the AFF Championship as he aims to lead the White Angels into the semi-finals for the first time in six years.

Myanmar begin their AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 campaign against Malaysia before taking on Singapore. They will then face Laos before a trip to Vietnam.

PHILIPPINES

The Philippines have appeared in all except one AFF Championship, with their sole absence in 2008 marking the beginning of an upturn in their footballing fortunes.

Before then, the Azkals exited at the group stage six times in a row, winning just once – against Timor-Leste in 2004 when Emelio Caligdong scored twice. But since 2010, they have made the semi-finals in four of their six appearances.

Key to the turnaround was improving player development at home and tapping into the diaspora around the world.

Chris Greatwich and Phil Younghusband scored as the Philippines stunned holders Vietnam in the 2010 group stage with a 2-0 victory that became known as the 'Miracle of Hanoi'.

While they were eliminated by Indonesia in the semi-finals, the tournament was evidence that the Philippines were becoming a force.

In 2012, the Azkals posted another win over Vietnam as they again made the semi-finals before a loss to Singapore.

A 4-0 win over Indonesia was the highlight of their run to the semi-finals in 2014 and, after exiting at the group stage in 2016, the Azkals returned to the fore in 2018 under Sven-Goran Eriksson.

They defeated Singapore and Timor-Leste and drew with Thailand and Indonesia to advance to the knockout rounds unbeaten.

A pair of 2-1 defeats to Vietnam followed, but the side had created history earlier in the year by qualifying for the 2019 AFC Asian Cup - their first continental tournament.

Then, 2020 marked the beginning of a new era as, for the first time in more than a decade, the squad was without the instrumental brothers Phil and James Younghusband.

Despite a big win over Timor-Leste and a 3-2 victory against Myanmar in which Bienvenido Marañón scored a hat-trick, the Azkals exited at the group stage.

The Philippines will target a return to the knockout rounds after being drawn alongside Thailand, Indonesia, Cambodia and Brunei Darussalam at the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022.

SINGAPORE

Four-time champions Singapore are the most successful team in the AFF Championship after Thailand, but December will mark 10 years since they secured their last major silverware.

It was on December 22, 2012, that the Lions overcame Thailand to win their most recent AFF Championship title as they became the first side to win it four times.

Though it's been a long wait without trophies, Singapore can draw inspiration from their semi-final run in the 2020 edition as they challenge for ASEAN supremacy again.

Last time out, Singapore beat the Philippines, Myanmar and Timor-Leste to progress to the knockout stage for the first time since 2012. Then, they came within four minutes of the final only for Indonesia to take the game to extra-time and win 5-3 on aggregate.

Their first silverware arrived in 1998 when R. Sasikumar scored the winner against Vietnam before goalkeeper Lionel Lewis, Noh Alam Shah and Agu Casmir all impressed in 2004, which culminated in a 5-2 aggregate win over Indonesia.

Alam Shah was the hero in 2007 with seven goals in a single game against Laos, while Shahril Ishak and Khairul Amri also starred as the Lions defeated Thailand to win title number three.

On the back of reaching the 2020 semi-finals, head coach Tatsuma Yoshida stepped down and was replaced by Japanese compatriot Takayuki Nishigaya. The new man in charge has plenty of talent at his disposal, including Hassan Sunny, Hariss Harun, Shahdan Sulaiman and Irfan Fandi.

But there's little doubt the jewel in the crown is Irfan's brother, Ikhsan Fandi. The son of Singapore icon Fandi Ahmad and considered one of the finest talents in Southeast Asia, the 23-year-old netted three times in the previous AFF Championship and has impressed in Thailand's top tier and the AFC Champions League with BG Pathum United.

With Singapore set to face Myanmar, Laos, Vietnam and Malaysia in Group B of the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022, they will hope to at least reach the knockout rounds again.

THAILAND

The 2020 AFF Championship saw Thailand secure a recordextending sixth title as they lifted the trophy for the third time in four editions.

Key to their recent success has been Chanathip Songkrasin, the MVP in 2014, 2016 and 2020. But in the early years, it was Kiatisuk 'Zico' Senamuang who was their leading light.

Kiatisuk's goal against Malaysia in the 1996 final proved enough for the War Elephants to be crowned the inaugural champions.

After a semi-final exit in 1998, Thailand returned to win all five of their games in 2000 as Kiatisuk scored in the first four matches and Worrawoot Srimaka netted a hat-trick in the final against Indonesia for title number two.

Two years later, they made it three titles in four editions after beating Indonesia on penalties. The Thais then went 12 years without a title despite reaching the final thrice.

The emergence of Chanathip was key to ending the drought as he scored in both the semi-final win over the Philippines and then fired home one of the tournament's most iconic goals in the final against Malaysia to seal the 2014 title.

Thailand defended their crown in 2016 as Chanathip put in another MVP performance as they saw off Indonesia in the final.

However, they exited in the semi-finals in 2018 before returning with renewed vigour under Alexandré Pölking in the 2020 edition.

The War Elephants breezed through the group stage with four wins from four, while Teerasil Dangda's four goals saw him top the AFF Championship's all-time scoring charts on 19 goals.

But it was Chanathip who stole the show in the knockout rounds, with his first-leg double eliminating Vietnam in the semi-finals before he added the first two goals in the 6-2 win over Indonesia in the final.

The six-time champions stand alone as the AFF Championship's most successful side. There is little doubt Thailand are once again the team to beat in 2022.

VIETNAM

Vietnam will be intent on returning to the summit of Southeast Asian football once again when they begin their AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup 2022 journey in Group B.

The Golden Stars Warriors' title defence was halted in the semi-finals of the 2020 AFF Championship by eventual winners Thailand, ending a campaign that fell someway short of 2018 when they emerged victors unbeaten.

Then, veteran striker Nguyen Anh Duc gave Vietnam a 1-0 win against Malaysia in Hanoi, after the first leg finished 2-2 in Kuala Lumpur, handing the ASEAN title to the men in red and sparking celebrations across the country.

That victory added to the title they won a decade earlier when Vietnam legend Le Cong Vinh scored home and away in the final against Thailand to help secure a 3-2 aggregate win as they became the third nation to be crowned champions.

However, the 2020 failure appears to be a minor blip in what have been years of steady progress under Korean tactician Park Hang-seo.

After taking charge in 2017, Park led the country to the runners-up spot at the AFC U-23 Championship in 2018 before many of those young players featured in the AFF Championship-winning team later that year.

Their stock has risen in the continental stage, too, after making the quarter-finals of the 2019 AFC Asian Cup and more recently the final round of the 2022 FIFA World Cup qualifiers and booking a place in the 2023 AFC Asian Cup.

The two-time champions boast a solid record in the AFF Championship, making the semi-finals all but two times since 1996. They also finished runners-up under Alfred Riedl in 1998.

With a generational talent in Nguyen Quang Hai at his disposal, Park will look to lift the AFF Mitsubishi Electric Cup in what will be his final tournament in charge of Vietnam.

Vietnam will open their campaign against Laos before hosting Malaysia. They then travel to Singapore to take on the Lions and end the group stage with a home game against Myanmar.



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
